Happy Friday everyone! It has been another busy week at St George's with lots of lovely learning. The weather has been changeable however we were still able to welcome our new Reception Starters on Monday afternoon for an outdoor story time session with Mrs Ramage and Mrs Toy. We are very much looking forward to them starting their learning journey with us in September.

This week has seen the staff putting the finishing touches to the children's end of year reports. Our teachers take a lot of time and care writing these and I really enjoy reading them all before making my comments on each report. We are hoping to complete the final checks on them next week ready to send out to you all during the week beginning 12th July.

I am finding it hard to believe we are now in July. It strikes me as strange how quickly the abnormal feels normal; how quickly we have all adjusted to the changes that COVID has bought about. It has been another immensely strange year in school, with bubbles, staggered starts, separate playtimes, and everything else we've had to put in place. We were all hoping to be able to relax slightly towards the end of term, however I was reminded this week of the continuing risks as local schools have had to close classes and year groups due to positive cases. It is a reminder, if we needed one, that we still have to be careful, not just in school but out of school to protect the whole school community. Public Health England has reminded schools of the need to stick to restrictions for the rest of this year and not be tempted to relax them! We are one of the very few schools who have managed since March 2020 without any bubbles popping! I know it is tricky and we are all desperate to get back to some normality, but we really do want to get everyone safely to the summer holiday without having to self-isolate and miss school. Therefore, a gentle reminder that if your child (or any family member) has COVID symptoms the whole household needs to self-isolate until a negative test result is given. The staff are continuing to carry out Lateral Flow tests twice a week and will do so until the end of the term. Thank you for your understanding and support.

I hope you all have a wonderful weekend and if you are watching the football – I'll keep my fingers crossed it's the result England are wanting!

Hedgehogs News

This week Hedgehogs were very excited to meet Mrs Ramage who will be the new teacher for Hedgehogs in September. The children had a chance to ask Mrs Ramage questions and there were lots of interesting ones! In class, we have been working hard in maths on number bonds. We have been finding two pieces of numicon that match together to make a certain number up to ten (or 20 for the Year 1s). Some of us tried to fit 2 pieces into a puzzle shape, some of us played a beanbag game on a ten frame outside and some of us made number bonds to ten towers. We have also started a new English unit based on the book Perfectly Norman. We thought about super adjectives to use to describe the wings Norman grew and how we would feel if we grew wings. We are continuing to learn about different athletes each week and this week we found out about Ellie Simmonds, who won two gold medals for Great Britain at the age of 13. Yesterday afternoon the children explored the grounds on a senses hunt to find different objects of different colours.

They had to work together in teams to find as many as they could.

Squirrels News

This week in Squirrels we have been focussing on telling the time in our Maths sessions. The children have been reading analogue and digital times as well as drawing o'clock, half past, quarter past and quarter to times on clock faces. Finally, the children talked about seconds, minutes and hours and grouped activities under the unit of times that they are best measured in.

In Science with Mrs Welshman the children learnt about all the different food groups and how we need to have a mixture of them each day to ensure we have a balanced diet. The children then designed their own meal plan making sure that they had foods that included carbohydrates, fruits and vegetables, proteins, dairies and fats.

Finally, in Art we have been looking at the work of Keith Haring and in particular his sport figures. The children copied his style of work, using bright colours and different sporting equipment, before creating their own by choosing a different sport. We had lots of "imagining iguanas".

Badgers News

In Badgers this week we continued to explore the life cycle of flowering plants. On Tuesday we went for a walk up the hill in Bourton and named many of the trees and plants there. We showed the children the 'dark (coniferous) wood' and enjoyed the view across the Blackmore Vale. We then sat down and sketched trees at Ms Rankin's house. The children used charcoal - so as to draw expressively and with a free movement - and they managed to use this medium really effectively and with great focus.

We have started looking at the book of poems 'The Lost Words'. We discovered that sadly words featured in this book have been left out of the newest edition of the Oxford children's dictionary. Acorn, bramble, newt, weasel, skylark, dandelion, bluebell and more. We are making sure we explore the words and give them lots of air time. We are writing our own dictionary definitions to start with.

Foxes News

In English this week, we have been looking at balanced arguments. We read a range of debates: Should children do housework? Should boys learn cooking? Should children have less playtime? These caused lots of discussions in the class. We then held a debate about whether children should be allowed unlimited screen time. The children were amazing at getting into role and sharing their views passionately. A couple of children have even decided to have a go at limiting their screen time for the next month to see how they get on.

We had an energetic session from Maths on the Move, flipping cones and throwing balls to help us generate 3-digit decimals. Whilst others had to follow a Maths trail around the classroom, converting measures. We have also started to think about ratio and the relationship between quantities.

In topic, we started to explore how much sugar is in our everyday foods and compared this to the recommended allowance for children. Foxes were shocked that some cans of drink and chocolate bars contain more sugar than their recommended daily amount. They then made a game to show some heathier swaps for traditionally higher sugar snacks.
