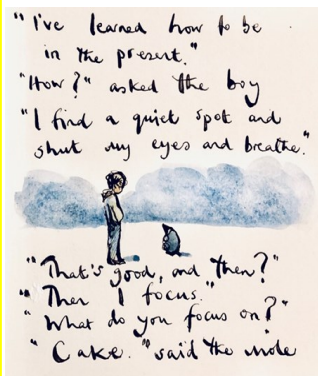
A wet Wednesday meant fun outside for Hedgehogs as they jumped in puddles and had fun on the field.



As the weather is turning Autumnal (its certainly chilly today) the children will need to come to school dressed warmly—all the classroom doors and windows will continue to be open each day to aid ventilation and reduce the transmission of viruses including Covid.

The children also need a coat everyday—even if the weather looks dry and they arrive at school in a car. We are using our outdoor space as much as possible. A pair of welly boots is also required as our field can get ever so muddy in the rain. Thank you.

Mindfulness



Each week Ms Rankin is leading the whole school in a Meditation to music session as part of our Tuesday Worship.

The staff and children have an opportunity to relax. To sit and take stock of their day.

Mindfulness meditation, at its simplest, is paying attention to what is happening in the present moment.

Cold, flu or the virus?

We know that one of the challenges for everyone is distinguishing coronavirus from other common illnesses, particularly amongst children. A reminder that the symptoms of Covid-19 which mean that the household must self-isolate and the parent advised to arrange a test are:

- *a high temperature
- *continuous cough - this means coughing a lot for more than an hour, or three or more coughing episodes in 24 hours (if the child usually has a cough, it may be worse than usual)
- *loss of taste and smell

If a child is unwell with other symptoms such as sore throat, earache, stomach ache, runny nose, skin rashes, or a winter related illness such as norovirus with vomiting and diarrhoea, then parents are advised to check online health condition advice – is my child too ill to go to school, and contact their local pharmacy or GP if they need further help.

The NHS 111 phone line should only be used for an urgent medical problem where parents or carers are unsure what to do. If your child is too ill to attend school, you should advise the school as per normal and arrange to care for the child at home until they are well enough to return.

Children with these symptoms do not need to arrange a test, and members of their household do not need to self-isolate, unless they are also experiencing a high temperature, continuous cough, or loss of taste and smell.

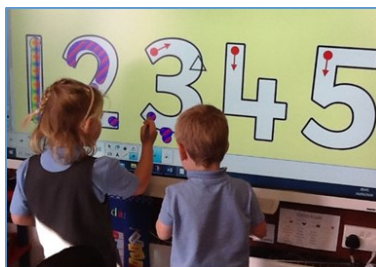

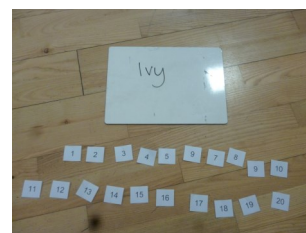
Squirrels News

Foxes News

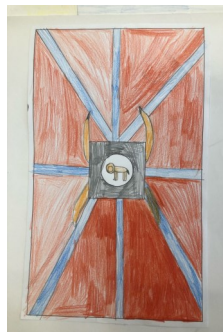
